#### What Students Say:

#### Student Survey Results (443 Total Responses)

93% of students found themselves more engaged in the study of *Macbeth* due to participating in TSC's playshop.

91% of students felt more academically prepared to continue their study of *Macbeth* due to TSC's Playshop.

91% of students were able to see Shakespeare as more relevant than before due to the *Macbeth* Initiative.

#### Student Survey Results (253 Total Responses)

89% of students rarely or never see any live theatre performances.

96% of students rarely or never see Shakespeare performances.

91% of students said their *Macbeth* experience was more enjoyable due to TSC's classroom playshop and performance.

# Student Responses to the following prompt: Please share one thing you learned from the Macbeth Initiative.

I learned how Shakespeare's plays, although seeming outdated, can be interpreted in many different ways for many different people. *Macbeth* is a lesson of ambition, power, and greed, and the Playshop helped me learn that the story is for everyone.

- I learned how important visual performances are to strengthen your knowledge of the play.
- I learned how well the lessons and characters of Shakespeare's *Macbeth* apply to the modern era.
- The Macbeth Initiative was extremely well put together, and executed perfectly so my attention was hooked from the start.
- I learned how clever Shakespeare is with his writing, and how it's okay to be loud and take up space.
- I learned that Shakespeare is more applicable to our everyday life than I thought before. The themes in his plays still play a role in our lives.
- I should watch more plays. They help in understanding stories and the interaction they can have with the audience helps to stay engaged.
- Performances are meaningful.
- I learned that Shakespeare is amazing.
- Shakespeare plays are actually funny at times and reading them makes them seem less interesting than watching them.
- Shakespeare is a lot more fun when it's performed.
- I learned that you shouldn't step on others to get into higher positions. I learned that even when bad things happen, people can come together to make things right.
- I was able to see how strong the emotions in *Macbeth* were due to the incredible performance I observed. Raw emotion was displayed and the actors took their roles very seriously, which allowed me to be able to understand the theatrical work better!! Truly such a wonderful work of art and I was very moved by the performance.
